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A. Summary of our reports issued	

This report is addressed to NHS Morecambe Bay CCG (the CCG) and has been prepared for the sole use of the CCG. We take no responsibility to any member of staff acting in their individual capacities, or to third parties.

External auditors do not act as a substitute for the audited body's own responsibility for putting in place proper arrangements to ensure that public business is conducted in accordance with the law and proper standards, and that public money is safeguarded and properly accounted for, and used economically, efficiently and effectively.

Introduction

Background

This Annual Audit Letter (the letter) summarises the key issues arising from our 2019/20 audit at NHS Morecambe Bay Clinical Commissioning Group (the CCG). Although this letter is addressed to the Members of the Governing Body of the CCG, it is also intended to communicate these issues to external stakeholders, such as members of the public. It is the responsibility of the CCG to publish this letter on the CCG's website. In the letter we highlight areas of good performance and also provide recommendations to help the CCG improve performance where appropriate. We have reported all the issues in this letter to the CCG during the year and we have provided a list of our reports in Appendix A.

Scope of our audit

The statutory responsibilities and powers of appointed auditors are set out in the Local Audit and Accountability Act 2014. Our main responsibility is to carry out an audit that meets the requirements of the National Audit Office's Code of Audit Practice (the Code) which requires us to report on:

Financial Statements including the regularity opinion and Governance Statement	<p>We provide an opinion on the CCG's financial statements. That is whether we believe the financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial affairs of the CCG and of the income and expenditure recorded during the year.</p> <p>We are also required to form a view on the regularity of the CCG's income and expenditure i.e. that the expenditure and income included in the CCG's financial statements has been applied to the purposes intended by Parliament and the financial transactions in the financial statements conform to the authorities which govern them. We report by exception if the CCG has not complied with the requirements of NHS England in the preparation of its Governance Statement. We also examine and report on the consistency of the schedules or returns prepared by the CCG for consolidation into the Whole of Government Accounts (WGA) with our other work.</p>
Value for Money arrangements	<p>We conclude on the arrangements in place for securing economy, efficiency and effectiveness (value for money) in the CCG's use of resources.</p>

Fees

Our fee for 2019/20 was £47,500 (2018/19: £45,000) excluding VAT. This fee was in line with the fee agreed at the start of the year with the CCG's Audit Committee.

Non-audit fees of £7,000 in relation to Mental Health Investment Standard Work were received in year.


This section summarises the key messages from our work during 2019/20.

Financial Statements audit opinion	<p>We issued an unqualified opinion on the CCG's accounts on 22 June 2020. This means that we believe the accounts give a true and fair view of the financial affairs of the CCG and of the income and expenditure recorded during the year.</p> <p>There were 2 unadjusted audit differences in the year which both related to the prescribing accrual with a total value of £2.725m. There were 2 adjusted audit misstatements in relation to trade payables and receivable reclassifications.</p> <p>There were no significant matters which we were required to report to 'those charged with governance'.</p>
Financial statements audit work undertaken	<p>We are required to apply the concept of materiality in planning and performing our audit. We are required to plan our audit to determine with reasonable confidence whether or not the financial statements are free from material misstatement. An omission or misstatement is regarded as material if it would reasonably influence the user of financial statements. Our materiality for the audit was £10.2m (2018/19: £8.5m).</p> <p>We identified the following risks of material misstatement in the financial statements as part of our External Audit Plan 2019/20:</p> <p>Primary Care Delegated Budgets – On 01 April 2019, NHS Morecambe Bay CCG was given, by NHS England, fully delegated responsibility for the commissioning of primary medical care services for the Bay area. The GAM does not contain any specific guidance on accounting for co-commissioning. The risk is that co-commissioning arrangements are not accounted for within CCGs accounts in accordance with accounting standards requirements. Our substantive testing did not identify any audit misstatements in this area.</p> <p>Expenditure Recognition - In the public sector, auditors also consider the risk that material misstatements due to fraudulent financial reporting may arise from the manipulation of expenditure recognition (for instance by deferring expenditure to a later period). This may arise due to the audited body manipulating expenditure to meet externally set targets. Our substantive testing identified 2 audit misstatements in relation to prescribing costs. These were not adjusted for by management.</p>
Regularity Opinion	<p>We are required to form a view on the regularity of the CCG's income and expenditure i.e. that the expenditure and income included in the CCG's financial statements has been applied to the purposes intended by Parliament and the financial transactions in the financial statements conform to the authorities which govern them.</p> <p>We reviewed the CCG's expenditure and income and in our opinion, in all material respects, it has been applied to the purposes intended by Parliament and the financial transactions conform to the authorities which govern them.</p>
Governance Statement	<p>We confirmed that the CCG complied with NHS England requirements in the preparation of the CCG's Governance Statement.</p>

Headlines (cont.)

Whole of Government Accounts	We issued an unqualified Auditor Statement on the Consolidation Schedules prepared by the CCG for consolidation into the Whole of Government Accounts with no exceptions.
Value for Money (VFM) conclusion	We are required to report to you if we are not satisfied that the CCG has made proper arrangements to secure economy, efficiency and effectiveness in its use of resources. Based on the findings of our work, we have concluded that the CCG has adequate arrangements to secure economy, efficiency and effectiveness in its use of resources except for the ability to return to cumulative surplus by the end of the next spending period.
VFM conclusion risk areas	<p>We undertook a risk assessment as part of our VFM audit work to identify the key areas impacting on our VFM conclusion and considered the arrangements you have put in place to mitigate these risks.</p> <p>Our work identified the following significant risks:</p> <p>Financial Sustainability. Our work focussed on the arrangements in place to deliver and maintain the cumulative surplus from 2020/2021. This included the way that the shortfall is being managed by the CCG, including the budget and QIPP setting process for 2020/21 as well as the CCG's strategy for ensuring medium term sustainability. This also focussed on the way that the CCG works with local partners to deliver cost savings across the wider system in Morecambe Bay through the integrated care partnership board. The CCG will not reach cumulative breakeven until the year 2023/24 per their financial plans which have been received by NHSE. The CCG is planning for a breakeven result in 2021, which was originally forecast as a small surplus in the long term financial plan, with significant savings still needing to be identified.</p> <p>Following the COVID-19 outbreak, normal NHS Business Rules have been suspended and commissioners have been deterred from progressing contract negotiations with providers or from implementing significant operational savings. Once this is over however we are not expecting historic financial pressures to be relieved and therefore we must assume the CCG will remain in the financial situation that it was in at the outbreak of the pandemic.</p>
Recommendations	<p>We are pleased to report that there are no high risk recommendations arising from our 2019/20 audit work.</p> <p>The CCG has been good at implementing agreed audit recommendations from prior years. No recommendations from the prior year were outstanding in the 2019/20 year.</p>
Public Interest Reporting	We have a responsibility to consider whether there is a need to issue a public interest report or whether there are any issues which require referral to the Secretary of State. We did not issue a report in the public interest or refer any matters to the Secretary of State in 2019/20.
